



The 1991-1992 elections saw Robyn Vincent as Secretary, Noeline Biermann as Director International Services, and Joan Ridley as the Director of Vocational Services.

That same year Noeline Biermann was nominated as President-Elect 1992-1993 but never undertook the Presidency, due to a career transfer interstate. Therefore, in the 1996–1997 Rotary Year, Julie Nicholson became the First Woman President of the Rotary Club of Darwin Sunrise.

The Rotary Club of Darwin Sunrise was eventually chartered 26th July 1989 and I was a Charter Member. New to Caloundra, my new club immediately gave me 30 or so new friends who gave me a welcome and greatly assisted my settling into a new city.

I really got involved when I was asked to attend a Board meeting for some reason and found out just what went on behind the scenes.

Having joined Rotary, like all members I took my turn in at some time or another assuming the mantle of various Directorships, Treasurer and when it looked like I could not avoid President's position, I made sure Harry Cohen would take on the position of Secretary to ease the load.

I am honoured to have been awarded Paul Harris Fellow recognition and 2 sapphires over the years.

I did not get too involved with District but did do a stint as District 9550 Secretary in 2003. Very interesting, and we got every Club in the District onto email for the first time. (It was a battle with some Clubs).

I suppose the major function I was involved with was the Orchid Spectacular, a high profile event, but requiring a lot of members' time and labour, and unfortunately did not make a lot of money for our efforts.- we took it on for 5 years and members breathed a sigh of relief when we handed it back to the Orchid Societies.

The Club was a wonderful mix of sticklers for the rules and those who specialized in bending Rotary protocols as far as could be done and so many volunteers. A great Club.

"As the first mixed gender club in our District, Darwin Sunrise was a trailblazer and those early days had a particularly positive buzz as we broke new ground while getting involved in the community and having fun. I have enjoyed being involved in events which bring the community together such as the NT Orchid Spectacular, the NT Garden Spectacular, and various open days, not to mention projects and fundraising for those less fortunate. It has been a great privilege getting to know our diverse members who come from all walks of life and their inspiring ideas, energy and generosity." Julie Nicholson, Associate Member "My earliest memories of the club is being invited to a few social functions as a guest and then again by invitation, to attend a number of breakfast meetings with my sponsor Shirley Collins. Prior to Rotary I was involved with a 'women's service club' the Quota Club of Nightcliff, but due to declining membership had folded and amalgamated with the Darwin Quota Club. Therefore, after that transition (along with Shirley Collins and Jenny Strong) I was looking for something new and exciting to put my energies into. After attending the breakfasts and social events I liked what the Rotary Club of Darwin Sunrise was offering, I liked the members and I was inspired by their projects.

Luckily enough, I also received a special invitation to attend the Charter Breakfast Presentation that was actually held on the 5 November 1989 at the Beaufort Hotel (now the Hilton on the Esplanade) and, what a fabulous and memorable event it was! Shortly after that, in the first year of Charter 1989-1990, I was inducted into the club along with all other women members, at that time, who became the first in the club, the NT, the District and perhaps Australia!

My involvement has been constant ever since, apart from a

I have served the Club on many levels as a committee member under various Directors, Secretary 2005-06, President 2006-2007 and now the Clubs Treasurer 2017 to current. As well, I undertook the position of Assistant District Governor (ADG) – District 9550 Group 1from 2008 to 2010, which was a great experience and huge learning curve, that took me to a new level of 'Rotary' involvement and knowledge and over that three year period I worked with DG's Joanne Schilling, Phil Dempster and Brendan Porter along with all Presidents / Club Members through-out Group 1.

The projects that are special to me are the Paramedics of the Year Awards that commenced as the Ambulance Officer Awards 20 years ago and the original Aboriginal Health Worker Awards that was instigated 13 years ago by Di Borella and Wendy McKay (now Robinson) during my year as President in 2006-07. They are both wonderful vocational 'signature' awards that truly celebrates the vital role each paramedic and health worker delivers through the services they perform, on a daily basis, within their communities through-out the Territory - year after year.

Over the years the events that stand out are the Orchid Spectacular, Beer Tasting Event, Joan Ridley Gardens (establishment and working bees), the Trailer and Fishing Gear Raffle, the Great Balloon Debates (and being chucked out), Sacha Drake Fashion Night, the Tropical Garden Spectacular, Wedding Bells and Beaus, the Foundation Movie Nights and more recently the Art Auction and the list goes on!

It is my absolute honour and pleasure to be a member of this wonderful club. I've made lots of friends, shared much fellowship, laughed, cried, worked hard on many community service projects, had lots of fun at so many Change-Overs and Christmas Parties but most of all I am a very proud Rotarian particularly, when through the work that we do, we can give back to the community and people in need." **Sandy Oldroyd**, Treasurer

When were you active with the Club? "I was born in Sabah, Malaysia in 1947 and since 1967 have been a practising Chartered Accountant and moved to Darwin in 1980. On joining the club I held the classification of 'Accounting Chartered'. This was my first time in a community service organisation but I was no stranger to committees and task forces and enjoyed the fellowship of our club very much. I was a Charter Member from 1989 to 2002."

Did you hold any Club or District position(s)? "Part of the Inaugural Board of Directors as Community Service Director, Director Fund Raising: 1991-92 and President Elect: 2002-03 but sadly, my work took me to East Timor and Rod Strong stepped in the President's role a year before his time."

Was there a project or special function you were involved with?

Earlier Community Services projects included

- The supply of an "Aqua lift" to the Salvation Army Aged Home and
- A second "Aqua lift" for the Parap Pool. These portable hydraulic pool lift allows disable and convalescing people to have easy access to and from the swimming pool for their exercise and relaxation.
- Purchase first aid equipment for the NT Council on Ageing
- Erection of metal framed greenhouses Moil & Essington Schools. This was part of the Australianwide Rotary Environment Project "Trees for Survival"

What are your memories of the club? *"My inolvement with our Clubs first major fund-raising evening the "Gala Fund Night" working with our leader and organiser Sandy Oldroyd, together with Shirley Collins and Jenny Strong plus others! "I have been a member of the Rotary Club of Darwin Sunrise since 1991.

I am proud that our Darwin Sunrise club was the first in the Northern Territory to include women and I was delighted to have been invited to become one of the first female members by the Past District Governor Guan Teik Yeo. Later my husband Austin and I were both honoured to be named Paul Harris Fellows.

I have many recollections of our morning meetings with a wide range of interesting guest speakers. One speaker I invited was the Reverend Donald Johnston who was both an Anglican priest and a schoolteacher. He visited Darwin and our club several times as one of his daughters lived here. In his later career he spent five

years as the Headmaster of the Martyrs' Memorial School at Popondetta, in the highlands of Papua New Guinea. After Donald and his wife Elin retired to Point Lonsdale in Victoria, he became a member of his local Rotary club in Geelong. In November 2007 Oro Province in PNG suffered extensive flooding, loss of life and property damage during Cyclone Guba. Soon afterwards, Elijah Sarigari, a former teacher and one of the community leaders of Oro Province, made contact with his former PNG School Principal, seeking help. Reverend Johnston then involved his Geelong Rotary Club and visited the province with another member, Anton Van Doornik. Their club provided immediate support and since then there have been Rotary teams assisting in rebuilding at Sariri Village in 2011, 2013 and 2015. This is one example of the importance of personal linkages and practical responses to disaster and disadvantage that Rotary provides.

Other memories are of less serious but no less important Rotary activities which have been most enjoyable. I remember the balloon debate but unfortunately not who won it or why, and the Australia Day quiz when Austin of course recited Banjo Patterson poetry. I was happy to host one course of the Rotary progressive dinner for a few years and Austin was proud to show off the then new Supreme Court during a Rotary visit." **Val Asche**, Honorary Member


